By the Numbers

- Industry decline started in 2006 after peak construction provided over 32,000 jobs.
- In 2007-2012 industry struggled with employment facing 26% unemployment rate in the industry.




By the Numbers

• Over 8,000 workers left the industry and over six years the decline continued

• In 2013 national construction growth finally hit 3% adding 168,000 jobs, however providing little relief

from the 1.9 million lost.



By the Numbers

- Maine added more jobs in 2013 with 17% unemployment and 26,400 jobs in the industry
- Keep in mind, Maine has 4,900 construction firms,
 96% are small businesses (under >20 employees)

What saved us from collapse?

- Energy. First we had wind, then we had transmission, and now we have natural gas.

Current "Concerns"!

- Quantity of work opportunities: Traditional bid projects in Central and Southern Maine very competitive (and not very many of them!)
- Skilled workers are now harder to find ... and what about that aging workforce? The skills of the retiring construction trades person are leaving with them! In Maine, 45% of workers in the construction industry are 45 or older. The "knowledge gap" is growing.
- Business costs are rising: wages (?); employee benefits (ACA); business insurance; W/C insurance; HR requirement to better manage our work force; managing the pace of technology
- Rural Contractors are competing with large national firms for federal projects in rural areas of Maine,
- What is the next BIG thing? AGC Maine is ever vigilant in helping its members prepare

- Over 12,800 families are on the voucher waiting list
- Extremely low income housing deficits is 19,201 units
- Low income units 22,001 units
- 56% of renters are unable to buy a home at the state median home price of \$109, 900
- Federal Low Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) at Risk
